

Education

Greetings,

Where did the year go? I know some things that went - the Intro to Fly Fishing, Fly Casting, and Intro to Fly Tying classes went they went on *hold*, thanks to Covid-19. Your team of enthusiastic, skilled instructors was benched. (And they *all remain healthy* !) (Does Pete Carroll have any of these issues?)

Are you new to fly fishing? Many seek the SSFF looking for a club to learn to fly fish or to improve their skills. Many long-term fishers often quote the same statistic: a year invested in training with a club is equal to about seven years of thrashing about on your own. The bottom line is that fishers accelerate their learning curves by joining a club and attending qualified, experienced instruction.

Here's the run-down of our training, when we are able to present it.

We (normally) offer three formal classes.

Spring: *Introduction to Fly Fishing* Five weeks, once per week, two and a half hours per night. Includes:

- History of fly fishing
- Fly fishing gear: clothing, rods, reels, fly lines and leaders, and flies, useful knots
- Floatation devices including U-tubes, pontoon boats, kayaks..
- Locating fish in rivers and streams, lakes, and the South Puget Sound
- Local fish species
- Entomology - stages of various insects' lives, and artificial flies that imitate the real ones
- An introduction to fly rod casting
- Water safety
- Conservation and stream restoration

Spring-early summer: *Fly Casting* for single-handed rod casting (not spey rods). Seven weeks, once per week, two hours per night:

- Classroom orientation to equipment: Rod, reel, line, leader, tippet, fly
- Start hands-on casting: Pick-up and lay-down cast
- False casts
- Off-side cast

- Reach-mend and S-Cast
- Stripping and shooting line
- Streamside session: Roll cast, apply Reach-mend and S-casts, line management and drifts
- On the water fishing clinic (day outing)

Fall - Winter: *Introduction to Fly Tying* meets for six weeks, once per week, two hours per night. Students tie a new fly each week. Materials are provided for students to tie the fly at home before returning to the next class. The instructor-to-student ratio ensures students receive a lot of individual attention. We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere: nymphs, streamers, and dry flies.

Patrick H. Berry, President & CEO of the FFI reported, it's time to start the planning process for "Season 2" of the FFI online videos. The videos actually started on 12/7 and will continue for the next two weeks. You can view the schedule by going to www.flyfishersinternational.org

PEBBLE MINE - There was an incredible news release on 11/25/2020. The permit for the Pebble mine has been DENIED. The TU folks in Anchorage are 99% sure this event won't happen. There's always a chance of 1% that the Pebble Partnership might attempt an appeal. The US Corp of Army Engineers denied the permit followed by the Trump Administration. The event has been going on for 25 years. It has been reported that the Biden administration will definitely deny the permit. If this event was allowed, it would cause devastating damage to that part of Alaska and potentially destroy the largest salmon run in Bristol Bay in the world. Over 17,000 jobs support the fishing industry throughout Alaska, Washington, Oregon and California. Time to celebrate.

ANOTHER "DAM" REPORT – Many good events are taking place in our area with dam removal. The three dams on the Klamath River in southern Oregon and northern California are scheduled to be removed starting in 2023. There is a solid agreement between the Governors of both Oregon and California, along with other organizations, to remove the dams.

American Rivers reports, along with their partners, they have been successful in removing the Middle Fork Dam near Bellingham, WA. on the Nooksack River. It's also reported, two dams were removed on the Pilchuck River, opening 37 miles of habitat to salmon for the first time in more than a century.

The removal of the four dams on the Snake River is still in discussion. The flood control dam on the Chehalis River is on hold for more studies of flood control without the dam.

Finally, there is a dam in Central Eastern Washington up by Oroville, which was abandoned in 1958. It is on the Similkameen River. The Enloe Dam is owned by the Okanogan PUD. The PUD is willing to remove the dam, but they do not have funds to do that. It was built 100 years ago. One of the biggest concerns, the sentiment behind the dam from upriver mining over the years. When removed, it would open 340 miles of high-quality, cold-water habitat for the fishery.
