



WSCFFI and The Academy


Washington State Council Fly Fishers International (WSCFFI)

The Academy will be conducted for the first time at Panhandle 4H Camp on Panhandle Lake west of Shelton from June 18-24, 2023. Registration is open with all the information on the new website, www.flyfish.academy. The website has all the necessary enrollment forms listed.

Three new Academy Directors - John Gravendyk, 425-615-0356, Bruce Merighi, 509-679-2274, Carol Anderson, 360-298-2999, and Matt Tuttle, Camp Director, will be conducting the academy this year. 22nd Year for the NWYC&FF Academy by John Gravendyk

Panhandle Lake Camp near Shelton, WA is the sight for the year's academy. It starts on Sunday June 18 and ends Saturday June 24. Though the program cost per student is \$2,200, the tuition for a student is \$500 for the all inclusive (including room and board) week long program. The Academy has a full roster of students signed up at this point (16 boys and girls). There is a wait list currently of 3 or 4 kids for 2023.

We have a dozen presenters lined up and 15 or so volunteers who will help out in various roles. Molly Semenik (FFI Master Casting Instructor) will be providing casting instruction the students and will be with us the entire week. Olympia TU Chapter President J. Michelle Swope will also be leading a class on fly tying as she did in 2022. We are still looking for more volunteers. Interested parties can log onto flyfish.academy or nwycffa.com, and click on "volunteer" at the top of the homepage. Fill out the form and we will be in contact.

THE SOAPBOX

Today's conservation action items include visiting the Hood Canal Salmon Enhancement Group website https://www.pnwsalmoncenter.org. They have multiple volunteer opportunities available year round including the Hood Canal Steelhead Project, chum salmon projects, and various work party projects.

Today's science item comes from the Small Forest Landowner Office (SFLO) at the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) e-newsletter dated April 10, 2023. The article, "Our Amazing Little 'Kermit:' the Pacific Tree (or Chorus) frog" is written by Ken Bevis and Dr. Corey Straub on SFLO's website (https://sflonews.wordpress.com).

The pacific tree frog (*Pseudacris regilla*) is the most widespread frog in the northwest and can be quite loud. They measure 2-3 inches in length and almost 1 inch tall. They can live for 5 or more years. They are recognizable by the distinctive black eye stripe (present in all color variants). They vary in color from brown to gray to bright green. This is an example of color polymorphisms and helps limit predation. Some individuals can change body color (albeit slowly) to better blend in with their surroundings while others require more care about where they rest to blend in and avoid being eaten.

Education / Community Outreach - by Randy Allen

Education

Our annual spring Intro to Fly Fishing class has concluded. We had a super enthusiastic bunch of positive students who became friends and new members! We look forward to enjoying time with you on lakes, streams, and the beaches near us.

We are currently in discussion with the City of Olympia for a casting class and also a class on fly tying. Look for casting to start late May or early June. Expect about seven weeks of casting. We will announce this in a future Hackle article. We are setting up the class dates while this is going to press, so stay tuned to your email.

Fly Tying, our formal class, will be held in the fall in one of the Olympia Center rooms. Look for this class to be offered October and continuing weekly through early December. And, the class includes additional "lab" evenings for the students to meet and practice tying their homework. Here you'll receive additional personal attention to help with the techniques. Class dates are being scheduled with the city.

Here is our annual course program:

Introduction to Fly Fishing-Taught early spring, one night weekly.

What is fly fishing all about? Is this something I want to try?

Students learn fly fishing gear: rods, reels, lines and leaders, waders, boots, and floatation devices (boats). We discuss locating fish in rivers, lakes, and the salt water, as well as local fish species you'll encounter. Our section on entomology teaches about the life cycles of various insects, and which artificial flies imitate them. Students learn three useful fly-fishing knots.

We include two Saturday mornings to introduce you to the basics of casting a fly rod.

Enrollment is through the City of Olympia Parks, Arts, and Recreation -

Fly Casting - taught spring-early summer, seven weeks, once per week. This class is for single-handed rod casting (not two-handed spey rods). Through this course you will cast a fly line for different situations including the wind. You'll also learn to overcome the effect upon your line by moving river water.

Introduction to Fly Tying - taught in the fall, nine weeks. Students learn a new fly each week. Students also tie flies at home and bring their homework to the next class. The instructor-to-student ratio ensures students receive individual attention. We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere including nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. After completing the course students can apply their skills to other similar flies.

May 25 & 27 - Summit Lake

We had outstanding fishing at Summit Lake last year for spunky recent rainbow plants. Most of us fished the area in front of and to the left of the launch. Does anyone know how to catch kokanee on a fly? Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife stocks over a quarter million kokanee fry in Summit Lake every year. There is a limited amount of shore access at the launch, so it is much better if you have a float tube or boat. Gas motors are allowed on this lake. Members with boats, please let folks know if you have space for another fly fisher. If you see other club members catching fish and you are not having much success, ask them what they are doing. They will most likely share some tips and probably a fly too!

Flies: wooly buggers, leeches, damsel flies, soft hackles

Lines: floating, intermediate, or full sink depending on style of fishing. Full sink might work best if trolling fairly fast in deeper water.

Recent Plants:

- April 11 500 jumbos (1 lb.)
- April 18 10,000 catchable (1/4 lb.)
- May ? 20,000 catchable (1/4 lb.)
- May, October annually Kokanee 260,000 (fry)

For those members planning to attend this outing, there is going to be a meet-up at 8:00 am at Shipwreck Café on Mud Bay Rd.

Damsel Nymph

Materials List:

Hook: TMC 206 BL 14-16

Thread: Light olive

Tail: Light olive arctic fox tail hairs

Body: Medium to light olive arctic fox under fur Body Veiling: Light olive arctic fox tail hairs Eyes: Plastic or bead chain in olive or black

Tying Steps

Step 1: Build a base layer of thread from the hook eye to about the middle of the hook shank.

Step 2: Tie in the eyes. Be sure to leave some space between the eyes and the hook eye. After tying in the eyes apply some fly cement to the wraps.

Step 3: Cut a piece of arctic fox fur and tease out the under fur, which can be saved as dubbing. Even out the tips before tying in. Tie in the hairs just behind the eyes (the hairs will extend past the eye and hook eye) and wrap down $\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{3}{4}$ of the shank.

Step 4: Cut another piece of arctic fox fur and tease out the under fur, which will now be used as dubbing for the body. Wrap the dubbing up to the eyes. Then go past the eyes and tie down the extended piece of the tail and cut off excess.

Step 5: Cut a piece of arctic fox fur (want to go from hook eye to base of tail) and tease out the under fur. Spread out the hairs like a fan and tie in front of the eyes (want the tips to be even with base of the tail) with two wraps. Then take two wraps behind the eyes. Pull the fur back over the eyes and tie down behind them. Trim as necessary to have it blend in with base of tail and shorten as necessary.

Step 6: Come back in front of the eyes and make a few wraps to finish the head and then whip finish.



Continue up Plum St. as it changes its name to East Bay Drive and then to Boston Harbor Road. About 4 miles north of the State Ave. signal is a Shell gas station; you'll find the Fire Department just past the Shell on the right side.
