

# 22nd Year for the NWYC&FF Academy by John Gravendyk

Panhandle Lake Camp near Shelton, WA is the sight for the year's academy. It starts on Sunday June 18 and ends Saturday June 24. Though the program cost per student is \$2,200, the tuition for a student is \$500 for the all inclusive (including room and board) week long program. The Academy has a full roster of students signed up at this point (16 boys and girls). There is a wait list currently of 3 or 4 kids for 2023.

We have a dozen presenters lined up and 15 or so volunteers who will help out in various roles. Molly Semenik (FFI Master Casting Instructor) will be providing casting instruction the students and will be with us the entire week. Olympia TU Chapter President J. Michelle Swope will also be leading a class on fly tying as she did in 2022. We are still looking for more volunteers. #### THE SOAPBOX

#### Greetings,

Today's volunteer opportunity is with the U.S. National Forest Service (USFS), specifically, Olympic National Forest. Go to fs.usda.gov/main/Olympic, click on menu, click on working with us, and then volunteering. The volunteer opportunities are different for each national forest. If you want to look at any other national forests, substitute the forest name for Olympic in the link provided above. Type the national forest as one word.

The science fact for today comes courtesy of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Hummingbird feather iridescent colors are created at the nanoscopic level. Most bird feather colors are created through pigment, but hummingbirds produce iridescence through the feather structure by scattering light in the feather tips. Inside the nanostructure of hummingbird feathers, stacks of pancake-shaped structures, called melanosomes, function as multi-layer mirrors, with highly precise spacing that results in bright flashes of color that can only be seen at specific angles.

#### **Education**

No sooner did we complete our own intro to fly fishing course when our good friend, Stacey Nelson - Griffin Middle School PE teacher, contacted us. She was conducting another fly fishing class for about 55 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students. She requested our help with fly casting and fly tying sessions. Stacey was a very quick-study last year when she inherited the fly fishing class from a retiring teacher. Last year with instruction from Kevin Angevine and Don Alexander each lunch period she learned to tie the next day's fly pattern so she could help present and speak about the tying techniques from her experience.

This year she took on much more responsibility for the course; we were really impressed with how much she had retained to transfer to her students. The 6th grade students were brand new to the fly fishing elective, and many 7th and 8th graders had taken the class last spring in their previous grade level. The returning students impressed us with their experience and skills. They were able to help several new students who had not taken the class last year. The quality of their flies showed notable improvement.

Again, Stacey arranged for a field trip for the youngsters to Long's Pond. There we met a gent from WDFW, John Pahutski, who assured us that the lake had a number of good size fish. Things were a little slow in the cool morning, but after lunch the action improved considerably.

One of the returning students, Emmett, helped his fellow students to catch around 20 bluegill. Others caught a number of trout, perch, and a sizable carp. It was a great wrap-up to another great course these youngsters really appreciated.

Our crew who made this possible included Kevin Angevine, Doug Dunster, Phil Jaramillo and his neighbor, Aaron, Max Doerge, and Tobey Anderson. Thanks to all of you for contributing your skills toward this excellent community education.

Update: Fly Tying, our formal class, will be held in the fall in the Olympia Center. We will have nine Mondays October 23 through December 14. A new fly will be taught weekly for eight weeks. Also included will be four "lab" evenings to receive additional personal attention to help with the techniques. And yes, homework. Students will learn the fly in the Monday class, then produce another ten or so of them at home.

Here is our annual course program:

**Introduction to Fly Fishing**-Taught early spring, one night weekly.

What is fly fishing all about? Is this something I want to try?

Students learn fly fishing gear: rods, reels, lines and leaders, waders, boots, and floatation devices (boats). We discuss locating fish in rivers, lakes, and the salt water, as well as local fish species you'll encounter. Our section on entomology teaches about the life cycles of various insects, and which artificial flies imitate them. Students learn three useful fly-fishing knots.

We include two Saturday mornings to introduce you to the basics of casting a fly rod. Enrollment is through the City of Olympia Parks, Arts, and Recreation -

Fly Casting - taught spring-early summer, seven weeks, once per week. This class is for single-handed rod casting (not two-handed spey rods). Through this course you will cast a fly line for different situations including the wind. You'll also learn to overcome the effect upon your line by moving river water.

Introduction to Fly Tying - taught in the fall, nine weeks. Students learn a new fly each week. Students also tie flies at home and bring their homework to the next class. The instructor-to-student ratio ensures students receive individual attention. We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere including nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. After completing the course students can apply their skills to other similar flies.

#### June 22 & 24 - Deep Lake

June 22 & 24 - Deep Lake at Millersylvania State Park (Thurston County) - rainbow, bluegill, bass, perch, pumpkinseed sunfish.

You cannot launch boats from a trailer here, but there is good access for car toppers, float tubes, and pontoons. There is a fishing dock and good access for bank fishing throughout the park. It could be crowded on the weekend. I fished it in on a weekday in early June. Rainbow were not being cooperative, but I had fun catching lots of bluegill, sunfish and small bass.

Flies: chironomids, wooly buggers, leeches, damsel flies, soft hackles Lines: floating, intermediate, or full sink depending on style of fishing.

#### **Recent Plants:**

April 12 - May 23 - 3 plants totaling ~ 11,000 (1/4 lb.)

**Directions**: Use Google Maps and get Directions. Southbound I-5 to 93 St; Exit Eastbound. Turn right on Tilley Rd. Head South to Millersylvania State Park.

### B.U.B (Big Ugly Bug) Fly

#### **Materials List:**

Hook: TMC 200R or Daiichi 1270

Weight: 0.20 lead

Thread: 6/0 yellow thread

Tail: Light olive arctic fox tail hairs

Body: Yellow chenille (size 2) or yellow ultra chenille (standard), or peacock hurl

Body Hackle: Yellow feather

Antennae and Tail: 2 pieces of yellow round rubber (medium)

#### **Tying Steps**

Step 1: Put on 10 wraps of lead.

Step 2: Center the lead between the hook eye and hook point and then use a regular thread or flossier thread to tie the lead down. Wrap thread in front and behind lead to make a nice smooth body. Make sure all the lead wraps are covered. Tie off the thread with a couple of half hitches at the front.

Step 3: Now make a base with the 6/0 yellow thread. Bring it all the way back to the hook barb and build it up a little.

Step 4: Take two pieces of medium round rubber (leave them together) and place on top of the hook such that half of it is in the front and half of it is behind. Tie it in at the hook point and wrap to the front of the hook and then back to where it was first tied in.

Step 5: Take a yellow feather, strip some of it back at the base and then tie in where the rubber was first tied in.

Step 6: Take a piece of yellow chenille, strip a little from the tip and tie in at same location the feather was tied in. Wrap the thread to the front of the hook and make a half hitch. Then wrap the chenille to the front the front of the hook and tie off. Make a half hitch.

Step 7: Wrap the feather towards the front palmer style and tie off. The pull everything back and make a few wraps under the rubber. The do a double whip finish.

Step 8: Pull front antennae back and measure to where it is just beyond hook. Give it a little pull and then cut. The two pieces will flair. Repeat for the tail. Pull forward and measure to the front of the hook eye, give it a little pull and cut. The two pieces will flair.

About 4 miles north of the State Ave. signal is a Shell gas station; you'll find the Fire Department just past the Shell on the right side.
