This time of year marks the season of preparation for the next calendar year of events with the South Sound Fly Fishers. We need input from club members as to which groups you would like to see the club support with your financial donations. In 2022 we made donations to the following groups: Fly Fishers International, Casting for Recovery, Project Healing Waters, Hood Canal Salmon Enhancement Group (SEG), South Sound SEG, Osprey, and Long Live the Kings. The donations made to these groups are in addition to the dedicated conservation funds that we support on an annual basis: Coastal Cutthroat Coalition, Alan Harger Fund (NorthWest Youth Conservation & Fly Fishing Academy), and the Munn Lake Stewardship Fund. The funds used by the club for conservation donations come from our bi-annual auction and from donations from individuals. If you have ideas for how to use club funds for conservation and education, please let us know.

One final note, the November club meeting is scheduled for Tuesday November 21st. That is the Tuesday of Thanksgiving week. We tried to get this date changed to the 14th, but the fire station is already booked for that date. So, if you are in town plan to come and join everyone at the club meeting in November.

Remember, fly fishing is the most fun you can have when not catching fish.

October 17, 2023 Make Dry Fly and Emerger Fishing Work Skip Morris

Skip is the author of 18 books on fly fishing and fly tying (among them, Fly Tying Made Clear and Simple, Fly Fishing Trout Lakes with Morris & Chan, The Art of Tying The Dry Fly, and Western River Hatches), is the host on six instructional videos (Tying Foam Flies, Fly Fishing for Bass and Panfish...) and has spoken at sportsman's shows, fly-fishing shows, and fly clubs in Arizona, New Jersey, Toronto, Alabama, Illinois—all over the US, Canada, and overseas. A few years ago he and Lefty Kreh were co-headliners at the Great Waters shows in Chicago and Minneapolis.

Skip's presentation is "Make Dry Fly and Emerger Fishing Work." This presentation covers dry flies of all kinds and floating to half-floating emerger-flies. This was a good show not long ago, but Skip went back, dismantled it, and rebuilt it almost from scratch. So, it's gone from a good, solid show to a really strong one.


Beginners and seasoned fly fishers alike will find plenty of interest here: when to and when not to fish an attractor (along with a look at some excellent attractor dry flies), casts for achieving a drag-free fly drift, how to sink tippet to turn it almost invisible, dry flies on creeks vs. dry flies on rivers, when to twitch a dry fly, a close look at various dry-fly designs and how each is designed to be fished, considerations for choosing the right fly to imitate various insects, and so on, and so on...

Not merely a dry classroom presentation, "Make Dry Fly and Emerger Fishing Work" has stories and humor woven through it, to entertain as well as inform.

Skip will also demonstrate some fly tying of his favorite patterns.



Washington State Council Fly Fishers International (WSCFFI)

The WSCFFI has reserved Saturday, May 4, 2024 at Ballinger Center, Mountlake Terrace for our next fly tying and casting fair.

The Clark-Skamania Flyfishers have agreed to conduct a fly tying and casting event in the Vancouver area in the fall of 2024. The problem they are experiencing is locating a venue that is compatible for fly tying and casting.

The FFI is engaging with the Furimsky Shows to have the FFI involved in each of the six regional fly fishing shows the company is hosting in 2024, including Bellevue (Meydenbauer Center), February 17-18, 2024. They are looking for support from the WSCFFI/FFI in casting clinics, fly tying demos, classes, knot tying, etc.



Education Fly Tying Instructors Needed!

We need nine instructors to help teach 15 students to tie in our upcoming fly tying class.

You will work with the students one-on-one as they need. This is not about teaching the pattern in front of the room. We have established a good training method for that, and we have that covered. If you are really interested in that aspect let me know.

We know some students will require more help than others. Nine instructors sounds like a lot, but when you subtract one instructor for each student who needs more assistance, that leaves eight instructors - one for two students.

Please contact me if you can help. We teach Mondays, Oct 23 - Dec 18. I will provide you with the student handouts for each fly so that you can tie them at home and see where the student may experience difficulties.

It'll be fun. You'll see.

Location: All classes and labs are in The Olympia Center, 222 Columbia St. NW, Olympia.

Here is our annual education program:

Introduction to Fly Fishing-Taught early spring, one night weekly.

What is fly fishing all about? Is this something I want to try?

Students learn about fly fishing gear: rods, reels, lines and leaders, waders, boots, and floatation devices (boats). We discuss locating fish in rivers, lakes, and the salt water, as well as local fish species. Our section on entomology teaches about the life cycles of various insects, and which artificial flies imitate them. Students learn three useful fly-fishing knots.

We include two Saturday mornings to introduce the basics of casting a fly rod.

Fly Casting - taught spring-early summer, seven weeks, once per week. This class is for single-handed rod casting (not two-handed spey rods). Through this course you will cast a fly line for different situations including the wind. You'll also learn to overcome the effect upon your line by moving river water.

Introduction to Fly Tying - taught in the fall, nine weeks. Students learn a new fly each week. Students also tie flies at home and bring their homework to the next class. The instructor-to-student ratio ensures students receive individual attention. We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere including nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. After completing the course students can apply their skills to other similar flies.

October 19 & 21 - Nahwatzel Lake

Mason County - rainbow trout, coastal cutthroat trout, largemouth bass

Meet: Shipwreck Café, Madrona Beach Road at Mud Bay Road at 8:00 am

This month's outing will be to Nahwatzel Lake for some fall rainbows. It is known to have some big trout in it. I have only fished this lake during the spring. I am not sure what flies and techniques work best in the fall but expect there are several club members that have some suggestions. We will address this at the monthly meeting on October 17.

There is limited fishing access at the launch area. Boats or float tubes are required for decent fishing.

Recent plants included 3,085 rainbow averaging 1 lb. on Sept. 22 and 25.

Flies: wooly buggers, leeches, chironomids.

Directions: 101 to Shelton. Then take the W. Shelton-Matlock Rd. toward Matlock. Launch is on right at about 11 Miles.

Fly of the Month

Simi Seal Leech

This is a good pattern for stillwaters. This fly can be tied in different colors, but the most common is black. However, for this tutorial, the fly tyer used white.

Materials

- Hook: Nymph/streamer 2xl, sizes 6 12
- Bead: Tungsten (can also use a conehead for extra weight)

Thread: 6/0 red

Body: Natural Angora Goat Baby Seal Substitute

Tail: Natural Angora Goat Baby Seal Substitute

Ribbing: Optional -- Ultra Wire (small) or tinsel

Tying Instructions

- 1. Place the bead on the hook.
- 2. Attach the thread behind the bead and wrap down the shank to just before the hook bend.
- 3. Grab a small clump of Angora to tie in the tail. The length of the tail is just a little more than the body length. There are two ways of tying in the tail:
 - a. Tie in the Angora and then trim what is in front toward the eye of the hook.
 - b. Take a lesser amount of Angora, tie it in and then take all of the excess that is in front, pull it back, and lock it in.
- 4. Build up the body by wrapping the thread to the bead and back to the tail.
- 5. Create a dubbing loop and add Angora to it. Wrap the loop forward to the bead and tie off. As you make each wrap, pull the fibers toward the tail (aka palmering back).

- 6. Build up a little head behind the bead with the thread, whip finish, and then seal with head cement.
- 7. Take a little piece of Velcro and use it to pull out the fibers to stretch them out so they are pulled away from the body.

Directions:

<u>From the north</u> - Use I-5 south exit 105B and stay right toward the port of Olympia. Follow the main road as it changes its name to East Bay Drive and then to Boston Harbor Road. About 4 miles north of the State Ave. signal is a Shell gas station; you'll find the Fire Department just past the Shell on the right side.

<u>From the south</u> - Use I-5 north exit 105 and stay right toward the port of Olympia. Go right (north) at the round-a-bout, then left at the Plum Street signal. Continue up Plum St. as it changes its name to East Bay Drive and then to Boston Harbor Road. About 4 miles north of the State Ave. signal is a Shell gas station; you'll find the Fire Department just past the Shell on the right side.
