

Munn Lake Fish Fund

The South Sound Fly Fishers has a contractual agreement with the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife for the purpose of helping to purchase fish food. The WDFW plants fish in Munn Lake. The money you donate to the Munn Lake fund is for this purpose. WDFW does not allow us to purchase fish, so we give the money for the purchase of fish food to grow and plant bigger fish. To my knowledge we are the only club in our area that does this with the WDFW. Each year we agree to pay the WDFW \$1,200, and each year the club conducts a fundraising drive to raise the \$1,200. Those of us who love to fish Munn Lake consider this a bargain.

I thank all of you who have donated to the Munn Lake project this year and in past years. The club met its goal this year as \$1225 has been donated to date.




Total membership as of November 30, 2023 was 98 members.

Education

December 18 we will complete our nine-week fly-tying course with the City of Olympia. Let's get to the punch line. There hasn't been a fly these 15 students tied that you or we would not fish. Yeah - even their first attempt at a new pattern. We'd fish their first flies, too. We're extremely proud of this group of students. They've taken the class seriously, they want to do well, and it shows.

One asked, "Why do you teach these size 12 hooks? It would be so much easier to learn on a larger scale?"

No question it might be easier to learn. "Unfortunately, the real bugs you're imitating? Nature just doesn't make them bigger. We want you students to actually use these flies productively, and we want you to catch fish with them! You are imitating nature's bugs in their native sizes."

Where has this journey taken them? What have they tied? Brassie, Soft Hackle, Wooly Bugger, Clouser Minnow, Gold-ribbed Hare's Ear Nymph, Elk Hair Caddis, Foam Hopper, and a Parachute Adams. Times ten. They tie a total of 10 flies of each pattern which includes tying their homework assignments to fine-tune what they learned in the lesson.

Below are a few photos of work in the class as our students tied the Clouser Minnow.

Here is our annual education program:

Introduction to Fly Fishing - We will start this class in February 2024, exact dates are being worked out with the City of Olympia.

What is fly fishing all about? Is this something I want to try?

Students learn fly fishing gear: rods, reels, lines and leaders, waders, boots, and floatation devices (boats). We discuss locating fish in rivers, lakes, and the salt water, as well as local fish species you'll encounter. Our section on entomology teaches about the life cycles of various insects, and which artificial flies imitate them. Students learn three useful fly-fishing knots.

We include two Saturday mornings to introduce you to the basics of casting a fly rod.


Enrollment is through the City of Olympia Parks, Arts, and Recreation -

Fly Casting - taught spring-early summer, seven weeks, once per week. This class is for single-handed rod casting (not two-handed spey rods). Through this course you will cast a fly line for different situations including the wind. You'll also learn to overcome the effect upon your line by moving river water.

Introduction to Fly Tying - taught in the fall, nine weeks. Students learn a new fly each week. Students also tie flies at home and bring their homework to the next class. The instructor-to-student ratio ensures students receive individual attention. We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere including nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. After completing the course students can apply their skills to other similar flies.

Fly of the Month

Denny Rickards Stillwater Nymph

This is one of my favorite Washington lake patterns (east, west, lowlands, and highlands). It's usually the first pattern I tie on when I fish in a lake and you'd be shocked at how many times I've never had to tie on another pattern.

<u>Materials</u>

Hook: 2X long, nymph, sizes 10 through 14 Thread: Black, 8/0 Tail: Burnt orange marabou, sparse, length of hook Rib: Copper wire Hackle: Burnt orange grizzly saddle hackle, undersized, tied in tip first, wrapped three times Body: Olive Ice Dub or Caddis Green Wing Case: Black marabou, tied the full length of the hook. Head: Olive

Tying Instructions

1. Smash the barb. Start the thread behind the eye; cover the hook shank with thread.

2. Tie in the marabou tail at the bend of the hook (directly above the barb) with the tips of the fibers extending rearward approximately the length of the hook. It should be somewhat sparse.

3. Tie in the copper wire rib at the same point (directly above the barb).

4. Tie in the grizzly saddle by its tip, shiny side (convex) forward, at the same point. Hackle length should not be longer than the hook gape.

5. Tie in marabou wing case, at the same point, so that the butts point to the rear.

6. Dub a thin body up the hook shank to just behind the eye. The dubbing should end about 1/16" behind the eye.

7. Wrap the grizzly saddle forward and tie off. Use only three to four wraps. Tie it off at the same spot as the dubbing ended.

8. Rib the body with the wire. Weave the copper wire forward, making about 6 turns. Tie off the rib and trim the wire.

9. Pull the marabou wing case over the body, tie down, and trim.

10. Form a neat head, and whip finish.



Continue up Plum St. as it changes its name to East Bay Drive and then to Boston Harbor Road. About 4 miles north of the State Ave. signal is a Shell gas station; you'll find the Fire Department just past the Shell on the right side.
