Leader's Line

It was a great to see so many of us there, and I was impressed with how many visitors we had. That just shows your commitment in community outreach and cohesion within the club.

For our Feb 20th club meeting we will be voting on our 2024 Annual Budget as well as an amendment to our By-Laws. I encourage all to attend who can make it. We want to hear your input and collaboration on these votes. Included below is our proposed budget for this year which the Board approved to present to the club. Our operating budget for expenses such as payments to speakers, PO Box fees, insurance, webpage, and awards are all funded from membership dues. The monies collected and donated for conservation and education projects are used strictly for just those purposes. I write this to emphasize the importance of membership dues. If you have not already sent your 2024 dues please do so, and thank you. You can also pay in person at club meetings.

As mentioned at the January meeting, we have a need to amend the SSFF By-Laws in order to change the definition of 'Board of Directors.' The primary reason will be to open the pool of eligible candidates eligible for President, and second to increase voting input from all who volunteer their time to be at the Board meetings.

Current Verbiage:

Article VI: Board of Directors

Section 1 The Board of Directors will consist of the officer and director positions. Section 2 The Board of Directors shall consist of the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, the immediate Past President, and Directors-at-large. The duties and responsibilities of the Directors-at-large shall be determined by the President. When the SSFF is not in session, all powers of the SSFF shall be vested in the Board of Directors. Matters pertaining to policies, management and administration of SSFF shall be referred to the Board of Directors before being acted upon by the SSFF.

The new recommendation will be to absorb Section 1 into a single paragraph and list all Committee Chairs highlighted in yellow so it reads:

Section 1 The Board of Directors shall consist of the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, the immediate Past President, Directors-at-large, and the Chairs for Conservation, Education, Fly Fishers International, Fundraising, Membership, Newsletter, Outings, Programs, and Webmaster/Media positions. The duties and responsibilities of the Directors-at-large shall be determined by the President. When the SSFF is not in session, all powers of the SSFF shall be vested in the Board of Directors. Matters pertaining to policies, management, and administration of SSFF shall be referred to the Board of Directors before being acted upon by the SSFF.

I look forward to seeing you all on February 20th. Remember "fly fishing is the most fun you can have when you are not catching fish." Take care, be well, and tight lines!

This month's speaker will be Dr. Mara Zimmerman, Executive Director at the Coast Salmon Partnership

Mara's presentation will focus on habitat management and restoration projects to enhance salmon populations.

Dr. Zimmerman joined the Coast Salmon Partnership in January of 2019. Her career has been dedicated to the study and conservation of fish and their habitats. She holds a Ph.D. in biology from the University of Michigan, and has previously worked in natural resource management in North Carolina, Michigan, and Washington states as well as contributing internationally to the Pacific Salmon Treaty (US-Canada) and the Kamchatka Steelhead Project (US-Russia). In these roles, Mara has worked to bring the best available science to species re-introductions, large-scale habitat restoration, fisheries management, and monitoring programs. At the Coast Salmon Partnership, she feels very fortunate to focus her time on the Washington coast and enjoys working with local partners toward a future of sustainable and healthy salmon in coastal watersheds.

Bring your friends and join us at 4:30 PM to learn the facts about a game-changing conservation strategy for the peninsula. Jon Owen of Wild Olympic Campaign will outline the ambitious plan to designate new Wild and Scenic River corridors on the peninsula that will help protect vital salmon and steelhead habitat in one of Washington's iconic fisheries.

With each ticket attendees also will be entered in a drawing for a new Thomas & Thomas ESP 8 foot, 5 weight, 4 piece fly rod and other premium fly gear. Winners will be drawn at 5:45 PM February 17. You must be present to win.

May 4th the WSCFFI will conduct another Fly Fishing Fair at Ballinger Park in Mountlake Terrace, north of Seattle. This event will feature a rotating series of the best fly tyers in the Northwest, an introductory fly tying class, and full-day casting classes for beginners and advanced fishers.

Education

If you just discovered our newsletter, our five-week class, *Introduction to Fly Fishing*, will be on Mondays beginning February 26, and will run through March 25. In addition to the evening classroom sessions we include two Saturday mornings of fly casting.

Our team of instructors brings decades of experience to the training class. We are so fortunate to have this competent team working with our students. And we keep class sizes reasonable to assure individual attention.

The class was set to accommodate 30 students, and we're full at this time. If someone you know, or yourself, *needs* to get into the class, contact us on our web-link. We'll see if we can accommodate your needs.

The City of Olympia also maintains a wait-list. Experience shows that we can expect that three people will be unable to attend. I encourage everyone to register on the wait list. I want those seats to be used. If you are reading this and are one of those whose life has changed, please contact Olympia Parks immediately and tell them your situation. They will arrange a full refund of your fees paid. They're really good people. Here is the link to the City's enrollment page for the class, *Introduction to Fly Fishing*.

Here is our annual education program:

Introduction to Fly Fishing - Taught during the spring.

What is fly fishing all about? Is this something I want to try?

Students learn fly fishing gear: rods, reels, lines and leaders, waders, boots, and floatation devices (boats). We discuss locating fish in rivers, lakes, and the salt water, as well as local fish species you'll encounter. Our evening on entomology teaches about the life cycles of various insects, and which artificial flies imitate them.

Students learn to tie three useful fly-fishing knots.

We include two Saturday mornings to introduce you to the basics of casting a fly rod.

Enrollment is through the City of Olympia Parks, Arts, and Recreation.

Fly Casting - Taught spring-early summer, seven weeks, once per week. This class is for single-handed rod casting (not two-handed spey rods). You will cast a fly line for different situations including the wind. You'll also learn to "mend" your line to overcome the effect upon your line by moving river water.

Introduction to Fly Tying - Taught in the fall, nine weeks. Students learn a new fly each week. Students also tie flies at home and bring their homework to the next class. The instructor-to-student ratio ensures students receive individual attention.

We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere including nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. After completing the course students can apply their skills to other similar flies.

Copper John



- 1. Put an appropriate size bead on the hook (#12-18) put 6-10 wraps of lead-free wire on the shank..
- 2. Start your thread just behind the wire wraps. Wrap over the wire to the bead, then wrap back to the bend of the hook. This will lock the wire in place and keep it from moving.
- 3. Now tie in your goose biots for a tail. This should have a natural curve. Tie them so that they curve out and away from each other. Now wrap your thread forward to build a bit of an underbody. Don't build too much toward the tail but more towards the middle of the shank.
- 4. Tie the copper wire in the middle of the hook shank and wrap it back towards the tail
- 5. Wrap the thread forward again and stop about 1 1/2 bead widths behind the bead. Now wrap the copper wire forward to create the abdomen. Keep the wraps tight. You should have a smooth and tapered body.
- 6. Now tie in a strip of scud back and a few strands of pearl Flashabou or Krystal Flash. Thin Skin in the "official" material but requires a little more effort since you must cut it to size.
- 7. Tie in 3 4 strands of peacock herl, clip the weak tips off and tie them in at the end. Make sure that the thread ends up against the bead.
- 8. Wrap the peacock herl so that you build up a nice thorax. Tie it off and clip the excess.
- 9. Take a small clump of partridge or other fibers and tie them on the side of the hook next to the bead. Repeat on the other side of the hook.
- 10. Fold the scud back and flash over the peacock herl, and tie it down. Clip any excess soft hackle scud back and flash.
- 11. Now finish your tying with a series of half hitches or a whip finish. Now apply 5-30 minute epoxy and let dry.

About 4 miles north of the State Ave. signal is a Shell gas station; you'll find the Fire Department just past the Shell on the right side.
