The donations made to these groups are in addition to the dedicated conservation funds that we support on an annual basis: Coastal Cutthroat Coalition, Alan Harger Fund (NW Youth Conservation Fly Fishing Academy), and the Munn Lake Stewardship Fund. The funds used by the club for conservation donations come from our bi-annual auction and from donations from individuals. If you have ideas for how to use club funds for conservation and education, please let us know.

Lastly, we recognized Jim Maus at our September club meeting for his years of service to our club in multiple volunteer capacities. Please join me in congratulating him on being nominated and receiving the Dale Sweeney Award, which is a recognition that happens only every few years as deserved.

The Dale Sweeney Award

Named after Dale Sweeney, one of the South Sound Fly Fishers founding fathers, this award is given to members whose character and contributions to the sport and to the club reflect the highest standards of sportsmanship, integrity, and dedication. SSFF does not present this award regularly, but rather only in those cases where a member has either made exceptional contributions toward club endeavors, or where they have played key roles in club business over a long period of time.

Our speaker this month will be Heather Hodson (she/her/hers), the visionary behind iFishiBelong, Fly Fish Instruct, and United Women on the Fly. Heather calls Spokane, Washington her home, nestled in the heart of west slope cutthroat country with her life partner. Frequently characterized as a "Jill of All Trades" and an everlasting fly-fishing student, Heather stands out for her contagious enthusiasm for knowledge-sharing, mentoring, philanthropy, and innovative thinking. Despite not adhering to the conventional image of a fly-fishing instructor, Heather and her Fly Fish Instruct team symbolize the industry's future.

DIY Fishing the West -

Join Heather Hodson as she takes you on a DIY fly-fishing journey of four top locations in the western United States. Heather will discuss what's needed to be a successful angler in these locations, including fishing equipment, fishing techniques, hatch charts, baitfish migrations, flies, and leader examples. The roadmap includes travel, lodging/camping, best bites, favorite watering holes, supporting local fly shops, and must stop tourist traps.

The first stop is the Puget Sound in Washington State. Imagine yourself fishing with the Seattle Skyline for wild coastal cutthroat during the day and enjoying a 5-star meal in the evening. Next, we head to the sacred Paiute ancestral lands with the chance of catching a 20 lb trout on 5x tippet. The third stop is experiencing the emerald green water of the Green River, floating through the Flaming Gorge. Finally, we'll head to the famous Missouri River for headhunting, sipping trout, and swinging flies.






Heather Hodson Bio-Alaska Rainbow Trout

Washington State Council of Fly Fishers International (WSCFFI) & Government Affairs



The Council conducted the Fly fishing expo in Vancouver, WA. on Saturday, September 21. The classes were full, fly tying had a reasonable attendance, and the casting had the most attention. Steve Saville conducted the testing for the casting - bronze, silver, and gold. There were various stations: Walk-in-clinic, Casting Class #1, Casting class #2 and the Skills Development. All had good attendance. Tim Rajeff conducted a demonstration and talk on rods, lines and etc. He is an amazing caster. He could throw a line a good distance, bare-handed, without a rod. Tim is

the founder of Rajeff Sports in Vancouver, Wa. The company's primary brand is Echo Fly Rods. Since retiring, Tim said he has decided to get back involved with the FFI. He gave a recent FFI online presentation on fly rod design and selecting the rod to match a caster's abilities. The Clark-Skamania Flyfishers did an incredible job in helping setting up the event.

The NW Youth Conservation Fly Fishing Academy experienced another successful event this last June for 18 young boys and girls ages 12-16. Four of the participants came from out of state. The Academy will be conducted again at Panhandle 4H Camp west of Shelton on June 21-28, 2025. Over the years I've had contact with previous attendees via the internet; I've received graduation announcements, wedding announcements, and believe it or not, baby announcements from the past kids. These youth/adults now are wonderful, successful, just great citizens. There are some changes with the staff. John Gravendyk had to resign for personal reasons, and Jim Goedhart has taken over John's duties. Each class has maxed out at 15 students. We limit the student count to provide hands-on help; we want no more than two students per instructor. There are plenty of tricks and tips to teach, and this is the first time most students will tie a fly. We are there for them.

FlyTying Oct 7 2024

We also received our annual request from the City to schedule next spring's *Introduction to Fly Fishing*. We receive inquiries from our web-site from future students and folks looking to provide their spouse with a gift of this intro class. Here is our annual education program:

Introduction to Fly Fishing - Taught during February - March.

What is fly fishing all about? Is this something I want to try? Students learn fly fishing gear: rods, reels, lines and leaders, waders, boots, and floatation devices (boats). We discuss locating fish in rivers, lakes, and the salt water, as well as local fish species you'll encounter. Our evening on entomology teaches about the life cycles of various insects, and which artificial flies imitate them. Students also learn three useful fly-fishing knots. We include two Saturday mornings to introduce you to the basics of casting a fly rod. Enrollment is through the City of Olympia Parks, Arts, and Recreation.


Fly Casting - Taught spring-early summer, seven weeks, once per week. This class is for single-handed rod casting (not two-handed spey rods). You will cast a fly line for different situations including the wind. You'll also learn to "mend" your line to overcome the effect upon your line by moving river water.

Introduction to Fly Tying - Taught weekly in the fall. Students learn to tie eight flies. Students also tie flies at home and bring their homework to the next class. Students will receive plenty of individual attention. We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere including nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. After completion students can apply their skills to numerous other, similar flies.

October 17-19 - Blue Creek on Cowlitz River - coho, spring and fall chinook, summer run steelhead, sea-run cutthroat

Chili Feed and Potluck: Friday evening - Max will fix chili and other folks can bring side dishes. We will have a sign-up sheet at the Club Meeting..

This month's outing will be to Blue Creek on the Cowlitz River. This will be an overnighter for those that want to or you can just come up for the day.

Some members are planning to arrive Wednesday night and stay and fish Thursday Oct 17, Friday Oct 18 and Saturday Oct 19.

There should be a variety of salmonids available including: coho, spring and fall chinook, summer run steelhead and sea-run cutthroat. Coho run typically peaks in October with good numbers already this year through end of September (10,486 > 2x 5-yr avg. to date). A good spring chinook run is petering out with a few fish still around and fall chinook run has started with numbers slightly less than 5-yr. average (ytd). A good run of summer-run steelhead is petering out and winter runs aren't showing yet. Some of the summer-run steelhead that arrive at the hatchery get recycled (i.e. trucked back down river to give fishermen another shot at them).

Flies: Typical salmon and steelhead streamers, jigs and egg patterns.

Rods & Lines: 8 wt. shooting heads with sink tips salmon and steelhead. 4 or 5 wt. for cutthroat

There is an area that you can wade fish, or you can fish from a drift boat or a pontoon boat. Individual floatation tube and kayaks are not recommended.

Do you have item(s) that you don't use? Have you considered donating it/them to the club?

SSFF is registered as a not-for-profit corporation with the State of Washington and is an exempt organization under section 501 (c) of the Internal Revenue Code. Donations to SSFF may be tax deductible to the full extent of IRS guidelines.

While SSFF operates in 'Good Faith,' all sales are considered "As Is" condition. SSFF assumes no liability and the buyer purchases items at their own risk.

There are 2 approaches that can be taken.

The first, and preferred method (Donation):

Donate the item(s) to the club, and we will list it in our classifieds. All money from the sale of the item(s) will be added to the club's general fund.

The second method (Private Sale) available for current paid members only:

List your item(s) in our classified as a private sale. <u>No retail, business or commercial sales are permitted</u>. This will be a transaction between the seller and purchaser. The club will not act as an arbitrator or as an agent for either party. The SSFF club will accept NO liability in this transaction.

We suggest that a donation in the amount of 20% of the sale price be granted to the SSFF club. The SSFF is an IRS recognized non-profit.

The format will include:

- a short description (20 words maximum)
- price



Hook: Daiichi 1560 1X Strong 1XL

Wet/Nymph Hook

Thread: Color to match the body -

Olive 6/0

Underbody: Olive Sparkle Antron Dubbing

Bubble: Olive Antron Yarn Legs: Partridge Body Feather

Thorax: Brown Antron Sparkle Dubbing

 Start the thread one third back from the eye of the hook. Leave the hook bare behind the eye of the hook.



2. Tie in two strands of the Olive Antron Yarn. One strand on the far side of the hook and the other on the near side of the hook.



- 3. Dub a body using the Olive Antron Sparkle Dubbing at least two thirds of the shank length.
- 4. Make open spirals of the thread to behind the eye of the hook.

5. Pull the two strands of Antron yarn on both sides of the hook and get ready to secure them behind the eye of the hook.



- 6. Secure with tight wraps the Antron Yarn behind the eye of the hook.
- 7. Pull the yarn towards the body of the fly. This is why the hook was left bare so the material would slide to form the bubble. Secure the Antron yarn into position with tight wraps then cut the excess yarn.



8. Tie in a Partridge feather by the tip.



9. Wrap the partridge feather twice and then secure the feather. Each wrap stroke the fibers rearward towards the bend of the hook



10. Dub a thorax with dark brown Antron Sparkle Dubbing. Whipfinish and done.
