2025 Intro Fly Fishing - Casting2

Here is our annual education program:

Introduction to Fly Fishing - Taught during February - March.

What is fly fishing all about? Is this something I want to try?

Students learn fly fishing gear: rods, reels, lines and leaders, waders, boots, and floatation devices (boats). We discuss locating fish in rivers, lakes, and the salt water, as well as local fish species you'll encounter. Our evening on entomology teaches about the life cycles of various insects, and which artificial flies imitate them.

Students also learn three useful fly-fishing knots.

We include two Saturday mornings to introduce you to the basics of casting a fly rod.

Enrollment is through the City of Olympia Parks, Arts, and Recreation.

Fly Casting - Taught spring-early summer, seven weeks, once per week. This class is for single-handed rod casting (not two-handed spey rods). You will cast a fly line for different situations including the wind. You'll also learn to "mend" your line to overcome the effect of moving river water on your line.

Introduction to Fly Tying - Taught weekly in the fall. Students receive plenty of individual attention as they learn to tie eight flies. After completing their homework, students will have tied 80 flies for their fly-boxes.

We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere including nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. After completion students can apply their skills to numerous other, similar flies. Please contact Randy with questions. <u>https://southsoundflyfishers.org/contact/</u>

Conservation

CONSERVATION VOLUNTEERING OPPORTUNITIES

Each month, I look for opportunities for Club members to volunteer to perform field conservation work, particularly in support of State or local agencies' conservation actions. We are nearing the season for lawns, landscaping, and garden preparation. What private citizens do on their property can certainly impact groundwater and streams negatively.

We are fortunate to have an active Stream Team in Thurston

County. Since 1990, the storm and surface water utilities of the cities of Lacey, Olympia and Tumwater and Thurston County have sponsored and funded the Stream Team. Over the years, thousands of volunteers, of all ages, have volunteered for conservation actions and education associated with storm and surface water maintenance and operations. There are some volunteer actions on-going, and they will start increasing. Right now, there is conservation information on how to manage lawns, gardens, and other actions on your property. The goal is to keep contaminants out of the ground and surface waters.

BRISTOL BAY AND THE PEBBLE MINE

Each month, I look for a significant conservation action related to flyfishing resources. This month's action addresses a win for conservation in 2024 and a warning for 2025.

Bristol Bay, in Alaska, is home to the largest salmon fishery in the world. All five North American pacific salmon species, plus rainbow trout and dolly varden (<u>char</u>) use Bristol Bay tributaries for spawning. This includes nearly half of the world's wild sockeye salmon. With a history dating back to 1986, industry has been evaluating the area and proposing a mine, Pebble Mine, to extract copper-molybdenum-gold ore from a large deposit in the Bristol Bay watershed. Pebble Mine has been touted as having the world's largest undeveloped copper deposit.



Though similar to, and often confused with trout, Dolly Varden are actually a char (*Salvelinus* sp). To tell a char from a trout, look at their spots—char have light spots (white or yellow to red) on a dark body, while trout have dark spots (brown to black) on a light body. Pebble Mine (being developed by Northern Dynasty Minerals, a Canadian-owned company) was planned to create a large open pit mine using earthen dam holding ponds. Concentrated mineral slurry from the mine would be piped to a port on Bristol Bay. Mine owners had applied for permits to use roughly 35 billion US gallons of water per year in operations. The proposed Pebble Mine is in a seismically active area with known fault lines. Accidental discharge from the mine would be released to the watershed, predicted to cause serious harm to the fisheries.

The battle lines were drawn, going back to at least 2010. One side grew to a coalition of Bristol Bay tribes (the United Tribes of Bristol Bay), area businesses including commercial and sport fisheries, and a large number of environmental organizations, including Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC), Fly Fishers International (FFI), and Trout Unlimited (TU). The other side was the mining company, some pro-mining businesses, and some Alaska Native businesses as well as some of the positions of the Alaska government.

In 2010, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) was asked to prepare the necessary environmental review documents. Thirteen contentious years later with many reviews, in January 2023 under the Clean Water Act the EPA issued a final determination that banned the disposal of mine waste in Bristol Bay's watershed. FFI announced the EPA is to be applauded for their "Final Determination" that is based upon "best available science" to establish permanent protection to the Bristol Bay Watershed.

But this was not accepted by the miner or the State of Alaska. The State challenged the EPA's determination, and, in January 2024, the United States Supreme Court refused to hear the State's case. This action allowed the Biden Administration's position, which bars development of the controversial Pebble Mine, to stand. This was a major win for the Tribes, the environment, and the fish; however, it was a significant loss for the Alaska economy and the U.S. production of copper.

Change may be coming. During 2024, the State of Alaska continued in lower courts to challenge the legal decisions that have been made, so far without success. In February 2025, the CEO of the mining company released a letter to shareholders expressing his optimism on the future of the Pebble Mine based on several factors, including perceived changes to the approach to mining in the U.S. by the new Federal Administration. It appears clear the future of the Pebble Mine is not settled, and more regulatory and legal actions are coming.

It is difficult to sum up 40 years of history in a few paragraphs and it is also difficult to find unbiased, reliable information. What I have written comes from a variety of sources which are not referenced. A more detailed history of Bristol Bay and the Pebble Mine can be found at <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Pebble_Mine</u>. To assist in reliability, the Wikipedia article contains 149 external references. It should be noted the Wikipedia article is only current through the Supreme Court decision in January 2024.



Saturday, March 15 - Lake Lawrence 9AM

Location: Lake Lawrence Public Boat Launch, 17500 Pleasant Beach Dr SE, Yelm, Wa 98597

The boat launch, dock, and fishing beach are all located at the South Side of the Lake in 'Lake Lawrence Park' just look for the SSFF signs



Flies, Rods, & Lines: 4wt or 5wt. Bring two if you have them. One for indicator fishing and one with sinking line for streamers or leeches.

This lake is a 2 Pole allowed lake. However a 2 pole endorsement is required. The total cost for the two-pole endorsement is \$14.80 (or \$6 for seniors).

Be prepared to fish moderately deep with the cold weather. A slip bobber is preferred if fishing over 10' deep but a fixed indicator is just fine. Floating line can be used to fish chironomids or balanced leeches under an indicator.

Seven-foot tapered leader and 5x or 4x tippet. Tapered leader is not necessary if you want to go straight to tippet.

Chironomid flies in olive, brown, red, black in sizes 14 and 16. Smaller balanced leeches in size 6, 8 in olive, black, black/red, brown. Scuds and backswimmers/water boatmen might be good flies too. Stripping woolly buggers with a sink 3 is effective too.

Fan Wing Ant

Hook:	Size 2	/0 to 8, Steelhead	
Thread:	White, Red		
Tag:	Small silver tinsel		
Tail:	Red golden pheasant fibers or		
	dyed of	crest feathers	
Butt:	Peaco	ck	
Body:	Red fl	OSS	
Wing:	Fox so	uirrel tail fibers, fanned	
Hackle:	Brown	pheasant body feather	
Cheeks:	Jungle	e cock nails	
Head:	Threa	d and glue (regular or UV)	



Place the hook in the vise and attach white tying thread on the back of the shank directly above the hook point. Tie on a strip of small, silver tinsel and wrap the tag.



Tie on the tail fibers and trim any waste ends.



Cover the thread wraps with a butt constructed from peacock fibers. Trim any excess materials then advance the thread forward to the back of the eye loop. Whip-finish the white.



Select a long strand of red floss and tie it to the shank at the front of the hook. Wrap the floss back to meet the butt then forward again to join the red thread. Tie it off and trim the waste ends.



Pluck a brownish body feather from a ring neck pheasant and fold the fibers back in preparation to construct a wet style collar. Tie the feather to the hook by its tip and wrap the hackle collar. Tie off the feather and trim the waste end of the stem.



Select a clump of squirrel tail fibers and even the tips in a hair stacker. Tie it to the hook to form a wing long enough to reach the end of the hook. Trim any waste ends.



Divide the wing fibers into four equal segments and pull the top three out of the way. Place a loop of thread between the first segment and the other three. Pull the thread forward and anchor it in front of the wing.

Repeat the process two more times to complete the fanned part of the wing. Adjust the tension on each thread loop to evenly spread the four segments of wing fibers.



Select two jungle cock nails and tie them to the hook to form the cheeks.

Wrap the head, whip-finish, and trim the thread from the hook. Coat the head with cement or UV to complete the fly.

About 4 miles north of the State Ave. signal is a Shell gas station; you'll find the Fire Department just past the Shell on the right side.
