We have completed our seven-week casting lessons for our newest enthusiastic fly-fishers.

I don't think it's too much to remind you again who has done the work to teach these students. So, when you see them, please thank: Tobey Anderson, Tim Barkley, Murray and Ann Boulware, Mike Clancy, Max Doerge, Don Freeman, Bert French, Jim McAllister, Tim Mettier, Todd Parker, Jared Wood, and Lee Yeager. THANKS for all you do to support these students!

And this month's meeting program will be casting. Murray Boulware and Tim Bartley will set out their FFI casting skill level testing lanes to give you the experience of target and distance accuracy.

What good is distance if you can't place your fly where that fish is? Accuracy any day. Test yourself against those casting target lanes. Then watch your fishing success improve! I'm looking forward to this month's meeting!

If you cannot attend this month, in August at our picnic we plan to have some fun casting events. And September should still provide enough daylight before the meeting for casting. Join our monthly meetings! We're here to keep helping you.

#### **FLY TYING NEWS:**

We have set our fall dates for the Introduction to Fly Tying. We are avoiding holidays, so you'll see a couple of gaps. Classes will be Monday nights from 6:00 - 8:30 PM: Sept 29, Oct 6, (not 13), 20, 27, Nov 3, 10, 17, (not 24), Dec 1, and 8.

We also plan "Lab nights" after every second class: Thursdays from 6:00 - 8:30 PM Oct 9, 30, Nov 13, and Dec 4. Labs are to provide you more individualized attention from the instructors. We'll also share some additional tips that will help your tying experience. There are many ways to tie the fly, and you'll learn slightly different methods.

Classes include the fly pattern instructional handouts and enough materials to tie about 10 of that week's pattern... which you'll do as homework between the classes. Do NOT buy any materials or tying equipment/tools. See us first for suggestions. And use our new rotary vises and tools for the class thanks to our Phil Jaramillo and the Kingfisher Fly Shop in Missoula, MT, who donated the new vises. It's a pleasure to offer them this year!

You'll complete the class with 80 flies in your box that you tied. Flies that will catch fish about anywhere. These are proven, recognized patterns. When our team decided on these flies, they knew what they were doing from personal experience.

Fly Tying - Come see if it's for you. Enrollment will be through the city of Olympia Parks department. The class fee will be determined based on material costs when we order everything for the students. The City isn't yet set up to register, and I'll provide you those particulars as we get closer to the start date. We can take 15 students. Talk to us at the meetings for more info.

#### Here is our annual education program:

Introduction to Fly Fishing - Taught during February - March.

What is fly fishing all about? Is this something I want to try?

Students learn fly fishing gear: rods, reels, lines and leaders, waders, boots, and floatation devices (boats). We discuss locating fish in rivers, lakes, and the salt water, as well as local fish species you'll encounter. Our evening on entomology teaches about the life cycles of various insects, and which artificial flies imitate them.

Students also learn three useful fly-fishing knots.

We include two Saturday mornings to introduce you to the basics of casting a fly rod. Enrollment is through the City of Olympia Parks, Arts, and Recreation.

Fly Casting - Taught spring-early summer, seven weeks, once per week. This class is for single-handed rod casting (not two-handed spey rods). You will cast a fly line for different situations including the wind. You'll also learn to "mend" your line to overcome the effect of moving river water on your line.

Introduction to Fly Tying - Taught weekly in the fall. Students receive plenty of individual attention as they learn to tie eight flies. After completing their homework, students will have tied 80 flies for their fly-boxes.

We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere including nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. After completion students can apply their skills to numerous other, similar flies.

#### Conservation

## Tim Veneziano, Chair



Each month, the Conservation Team looks for opportunities for Club members to volunteer to perform field conservation work, particularly in support of State or local agencies' conservation actions.

In the February Garden Hackle, I highlighted two Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) conservation volunteer litter clean-up activities near Olympia. These activities, associated with the Chehalis and Satsop Rivers, are still open to volunteers. In the May Garden Hackle, I added a new conservation volunteer activity, litter clean-up at the northern part of the John's River, near Westport, WA. This action is also

still open to volunteers. There are no new WDFW conservation activities near us. If you are interested in volunteering for these open activities or finding out what volunteer activities may be available in areas where you fish or visit in other parts of the State, go to <a href="https://wdfw.wa.gov/get-involved/volunteer">https://wdfw.wa.gov/get-involved/volunteer</a> and hit the "See all volunteer opportunities" heading box.

In the March Garden Hackle, I highlighted the Stream Team of Thurston County. There is still conservation volunteer work locally that will be on-going through September for McLane Creek Nature Trail maintenance. In the June Garden Hackle, I highlighted Stream Team volunteer opportunities for Salmon Steward docents for the Deschutes River. Although Salmon Stewardship is still a few months away, this summer is the time to get trained (a 2-3-hour activity) to be a docent. There are new Stream Team activities starting this month; however, you will have to act quickly. There will be Stream Bug Monitoring on July 10 on Schneider Creek. In addition, Second Saturday Restoration at Sapp Road Park on July 12 will start to focus on weed barrier removal, soil aeration and invasive removal. I should note that many of the Stream Team opportunities fill quickly or have short lead times (not conducive to the schedule of out Club's Garden Hackle). If you have any interest in Stream Team activities, I recommend you go to <a href="https://streamteam.info/newsletter-sign-up/">https://streamteam.info/newsletter-sign-up/</a>.

In the May Garden Hackle, I provided information on the South Puget Sound Salmon Enhancement Group's (SPSSEG) volunteer docent training for the Kennedy Creek Salmon Trail this November. This opportunity remains available. If you would like to volunteer as a docent this year, please RSVP by email to <a href="kennedycreek@spsseg.org">kennedycreek@spsseg.org</a> with the subject KCST Volunteer. Attendance at a training class will be required in the fall. I have been highlighting volunteer opportunities with the fish biologist at the Hood Canal Salmon Enhancement Group (HCSEG). The intent is to find more "hands-on" conservation work. There are no present opportunities. The next opportunity will likely be from mid-August to mid-October. During this time, an adult fish trap at the mouth of the Union River has been operated 24 hours per day for several years by research interns and volunteers. The activity has collected data on adult summer chum abundance and has obtained adult chum for artificial spawning and stock supplementation. My understanding is this is typically a four-hour activity, starting and ending in Belfair, WA. You will need to register as a

volunteer with HCSEG. There has been no news to date on this activity. I will call the fish biologist and provide additional information at the July 15, 2025, SSFF Club meeting.


#### CONSERVATION EDUCATION OPPORTUNITY

This month, the Conservation Team is also providing an opportunity for members to increase their knowledge of conservation and learn about the front-end planning for a restoration project. The restoration project is the Duckabush Estuary Restoration Project of which HCSEG is a part. This project is an effort to restore salmon habitat, reduce flood risk, and improve the ecosystem for shellfish and waterfowl, as well as to improve traffic flow and safety. This project realigns highway 101 and removes the old bridges and highway over the Duckabush River. This summer, the HCSEG's Estuary Education Tour series has returned to the Duckabush with a lineup of guests presenting a variety of science topics. Although some of the walking tours have already occurred, three remain. The tours are on Wednesday afternoons, July 30, August 27, and September 24, 2025. Through these walking tours, you will gain a better understanding of the science involved as well as learn how the Duckabush estuary will be transformed through restoration. My recommendation would be to attend, if you can, the August 27 walking tour which Clayton David, the HCSEG salmon and steelhead biologist, is scheduled to lead.

#### PILCHUCK RIVER RESTORATION

This month's conservation article provides information on partial completion of a larger conservation project on the Pilchuck River, the first major tributary of the Snohomish River (see map below).



As background, The Tulalip Tribes, in collaboration with the City of Snohomish, removed the Pilchuck River Diversion Dam in the Summer of 2020. This action restored fish access to over 37 miles of priority habitat for the salmonid species found in the Snohomish River Basin, including Chinook, Steelhead, coho, bull trout, and others. Following the removal of the dam in 2020, Chinook, Coho, and Pink salmon have been frequently observed above the old dam site, completing their life's journey and spawning in the Pilchuck River. Since the dam was removed, efforts have focused on creating critical habitat for juvenile salmon as well as spawning grounds for returning adult salmon. In 2024, work began on the Middle Pilchuck Habitat Restoration Project near the town of Granite Falls. Log jacks (four to six logs in the shape of a triangular pyramid with a large rock in the center, all connected with wire) and rock collars (logs tied to large rocks with metal bands or collars) were strategically placed in the river near the town of Granite Falls. Significant work was completed in 2024. The last of the project restoration work in the middle section of the Pilchuck River is planned for August of 2025.

In June 2025, restoration of an 8-mile stretch of the <u>upper section</u> of the Pilchuck River, east of Granite Falls, was successfully concluded. The Tulalip Tribes and Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) worked together to build 30 log jams (from 320 logs). The collaborative effort aims to slow water flow and restore salmon habitat, using downed trees and storm debris.

The project is part of DNR's Large Wood Supply Initiative to source trees from DNR-managed land to support partners' salmon recovery projects. Including staff time, DNR put approximately \$275,000 into the project. The Tulalip Tribes, DNR's partner in this endeavor, supported by a \$600,000 National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) grant, obtained necessary permits and managed placement of the logs by contracting Chinook helicopters. The work was completely done on DNR land and has successfully enhanced the recovery of threatened (under the Endangered Species Act) salmon.

I wrote this article based on the following: 1) a Seattle television news report; 2) an April 17, 2025, letter to the public from Snohomish County Surface Water Management, regarding the upcoming Middle Pilchuck Habitat Restoration Project; 3) and a June 24, 2025, newspaper article, addressing the 2025 work on the upper section of the Pilchuck River, by Eliza Aronson of The Daily Herald (an online newspaper from Everett at <a href="https://www.heraldnet.com/">https://www.heraldnet.com/</a>). I will continue to follow this conservation action and certainly hope to see as much success in August in the middle section of the Pilchuck River.

#### **New Members**




Last week's river report showed 5,120 CFPS, visibility was around nine feet, and the water temp average was 50.7. The Summer Steelhead return is on the raise. Last week Barrier Dam counted 266 spring chinook, 132 chinook Jacks, and 139 summer run steelhead. ## Fly of the Month

#### JC's Electric Caddis Larva

John Collins a fly fishing guide and fly tier in New Jersey created this fly for early season trout fishing but can be tied in various colors and sizes to match the caddis larva that is in the stream. The hardest part is threading the copper wire into the micro tubing.

This fly can be tied in any color and size. The original pattern was tied in Chartreuse tubing and Chartreuse Antron yarn.

Hook: Daiichi 1120 Heavy

Wide Scud Hook

Thread: Olive 6/0

Tail/Under Body: Olive Antron Yarn Body: Micro Tube with

small copper wire

Legs/Thorax: Brown Ostrich Herl

Wingcase: Thin UV Resin

Before inserting the hook in the vise, take 10 inches of micro tubing and insert the copper wire into the middle of the tube.



Secure the hook in the vise and tie the thread to the hook point



Cut a one inch strand of Antron Attach the yarn above the hook point. Leave a length of yarn sticking over the hook eye, this will be used to help make a taper body



Wind the thread down the hook shank, securing the Antron yarn on top of the hook shank, until you reach where the tail will be



Fold the Antron yarn back over the top of the hook shank towards the bend of the hook to help make a tapered body



With your thread wrap around the body to help make a tapered body foundation



Tie on top the tubing and wire material



Secure the tubing and wire on top of the hook shank to the tail bring the thread to behind the eye



Using the tube and wire material use touching wraps to wrap the body to just past the hook point



Tie in the ostrich herl for the legs and thorax



Wrap the ostrich herl so the barbs stand out. Wrap it just like a dry fly hackle and use touching wraps. Whip finish and trim the tail.



With a lighter burn the herl on the top



Apply a Thin UV Resin to the top for a Wingcase and use the UV lamp to cure it

Continue up Plum St. as it changes its name to East Bay Drive and then to Boston Harbor Road. About 4 miles north of the State Ave. signal is a Shell gas station; you'll find the Fire Department just past the Shell on the right side.
