Hard to believe, but we're going to kick off another of our popular classes, *Introduction to Fly Fishing*, now our seventh year. Our training team must do something right because each class in the past has reached capacity with a wait-list. Consider the experience level of our instructors. Total years of fly-fishing experience for eight primary instructors exceeds 230 years. Students learn from our wide-ranging experiences, and we are very proud of it! Instructors will share their perspectives of fishing local lakes, streams, the Puget Sound, exotic South Pacific islands, Mongolia. . . . They've been around! And they share it all.

This five-week class is each Monday evening from February 23 through March 23 from 6:00 - 8:30 PM. Location is The Olympia Center, 222 Columbia St NW, Olympia. Included are two Saturday mornings of casting instruction. Because our weather is a little "iffy" this time of year we will determine the Saturday casting dates when we're a little closer.

What makes our education program successful is how our experienced members mentor the newcomers. We don't teach an Intro class and wish you good-luck-and-see-ya-later. We offer a structured mentorship program to provide the new fishers continuing personal instruction to increase their fishing success. Tell your friends who expressed interest in fly-fishing about this class. It's a great Introduction to start fly-fishing.

Here is our annual education program:

Introduction to Fly Fishing - Taught during February - March.

What is fly fishing all about? Is this something I want to try?

Students learn fly fishing gear: rods, reels, lines and leaders, waders, boots, and floatation devices (boats). We discuss locating fish in rivers, lakes, and the salt water, as well as local fish species you'll encounter. Our evening on entomology teaches about the life cycles of various insects, and which artificial flies imitate them.

Students also learn three useful fly-fishing knots.

We include two Saturday mornings to introduce you to the basics of casting a fly rod.

[**Enrollment is through the City of Olympia Parks, Arts, and Recreation.**](#)

Fly Casting - Taught spring-early summer, seven weeks, once per week. This class is for single-handed rod casting (not two-handed spey rods). You will cast a fly line for different situations including the wind. You'll also learn to "mend" your line to overcome the effect of moving river water on your line.

Introduction to Fly Tying - Taught weekly in the fall. Students receive plenty of individual attention as they learn to tie eight flies. After completing their homework, students will have tied 80 flies for their fly-boxes.

We teach a variety of flies useful anywhere including nymphs, streamers, and dry flies. After completion students can apply their skills to numerous other, similar flies.

Conservation

Happy New Year South Sound Fly Fishers. Good news for the Conservation efforts in Thurston County. A Grant has been awarded just before New Years eve to protect the Skookumchuck River. When I first moved to Washington I fished in this river very frequently. Because it was so close to my home and I could fish all day and make it back home just before dinner! I caught my first Wild and Hatchery Steelhead just below the dam. My first Wild Chinook Salmon and Coho Salmon! Even in the summer months you can net some juvenile steelhead and some sea run cutthroats on a nice 6 wt. The steelhead hatchery is just below the dam and the salmon hatchery is just below Bloody Run Creek. During the summer months the water management has killed the smolt that still reside in the tributary. The fishery has taken a big impact in the last

several years due to the water rights owned by the nearby coal plant. Running the summer flows at 50 cubic feet per second is not sufficient for fish to survive. So, in a landmark move for environmental restoration and sustainable growth, Thurston County has secured a \$2.4 million grant to purchase a significant portion of water rights on the Skookumchuck River, directly linked to the closure of Washington's last coal-fired power plant. This initiative marks a pivotal transition from a fossil-fuel-driven past toward a future focused on ecological recovery and climate resilience, promising a new chapter for the river and the communities that depend on it. For decades, the Centralia power plant, owned by TransAlta, was a major source of energy and emissions in the region. A 2011 state law mandated its closure, with the first of its two coal-fired boilers shutting down in 2020 and the final unit slated for retirement by the end of 2025.

This historic shutdown made the plant's associated water rights available, creating a unique conservation opportunity. Seizing this moment, Thurston County, with funding from the Washington State Department of Ecology, will purchase approximately 800 acre-feet of water rights from TransAlta's water bank. This water, once used to cool the coal plant's turbines, will now be permanently dedicated to the Skookumchuck and Chehalis rivers. The primary goal is to increase instream flows, a critical factor for the health of aquatic ecosystems.

At the heart of this story is the Skookumchuck Dam, a structure built in 1970 to create a reservoir for the power plant. For over fifty years, the dam has blocked fish passage, devastating salmon populations, including a run of spring Chinook now being considered for Endangered Species Act protection. The newly acquired water rights will now help mitigate some of the dam's harmful legacy by ensuring more water flows downstream, supporting cooler temperatures and improved habitat connectivity vital for fish survival.

Ultimately, Thurston County's initiative is a forward-thinking model of environmental stewardship. It transforms a relic of the fossil fuel age into a tool for ecological restoration. As the TransAlta coal plant powers down, the water it once consumed will breathe new life into the Skookumchuck River, demonstrating how a community can successfully navigate the complex transition toward a cleaner, more sustainable future.



Opportunities for the new year while the weather is wet and cold: I recommend visiting the Thurston County [*Stream Teams*](#) web page and enroll in the online Salmon Stewards Training.

This course will take you 2-3 hours to complete and will teach you the basics of what you need to be a trained Stream Team Salmon Steward.

Stream Team also has a workshop coming up, [*Amphibians of the Pacific Northwest*](#). This Northwest Life History talk will take place Saturday Jan 31; they recommend if you plan on participating in amphibian surveys, which typically take place during the months of March and April, then you might not want to miss out on this event!





Munn Lake 2024



Dear South Sound Fly Fishers, Happy New Year!!!

Our first outing of January 2026 will be in the great Pacific Northwest trophy fishery Munn Lake. The lake has been recently stocked. Stocked with some monsters. In November and December I personally witnessed several twenty-inch trout landed. Our outing this month will also be attended by our local Project healing Waters chapter. We will have shelter from the rain, breakfast burritos, and hot coffee for everyone. If you have a water craft of any non-motorized sort bring it along. Everything from inner tubes to drift boats will work just fine.

Munn has been very productive the last two months. If you're looking into getting a trophy fish I recommend a full sinking line. The heavier fish are holding deep. Intermediates will work as well in some of the shallower areas too. The lunkers I saw come in bit on black, green and brown wooly buggers. And one muddler I put on after snagging an anchor chain mid cast. The finer fly fishers among us pulled in several prizes on deeply set nymphs. If you understand this nymph voodoo let me in on the secret.

If there is more boat traffic than you want to be a part of in the deeper sections patrol the banks. My favorite thing to do on my way back to the boat ramp when I'm wrapping up is cast to all of the lily pad and weed banks. The place is lousy with bass and bluegill. In a good way. The most productive flies here are small, shiny nymphs. Good way to break a slump. But if you're feeling froggy then give some small, white, weighted streamers in there. That's what will tease the bass out.

Parking at Munn is pretty limited. If carpooling is an option I recommend it. And don't forget your Discover Pass and or DFW Pass. If you don't have one this isn't the time to risk it. Luckily Munn is heavily patrolled by fish and game. They keep the parking lot bandits at bay and the fish in the lake. So do them a favor and don't make them write any tickets on a Saturday.

Good luck everybody and I'll see you out there.



Picket Pin

Hook: Nymph/wet/streamer Size 8-14

Thread: Black 8/0

Tag: Fine gold tinsel

Tail: Two tips of brown hackle

Body: Peacock herl

Rib: Fine oval gold tinsel counter

Wing: Gray squirrel tail

Head: Peacock herl over black thread

The Picket Pin is one of those fly patterns that has stood the test of time. Developed as a trout fly for western waters in the early 1900's (1910-1915) by Jack Boeme, it gets its moniker from the nickname of the animal whose fur was used in the pattern. Ground squirrels or gophers were given the nickname of "picket pins" by cowboys because of their habit of standing upright in the fields. The fur from the gopher was used as the tail and wing in the original version of this hair wing fly.

As the fly gained popularity and moved eastward, grey squirrel replaced gopher and over time became part of the standard recipe.

While recognized primarily as a wet fly, the Picket Pin is also very effective when tied in larger sizes and fished as a streamer. It can also be greased and fished as a dry fly. It is buggy enough that it is a good imitation for a lot of terrestrial insects, imitating everything from hoppers and crickets to beetles, cicadas, moths, and large flies such as horse flies.



1. Place hook in your vise and start your thread. Add a tag of fine oval tinsel.



2. Take 2 tips of brown hackle feathers. Align the tips. Measure them about the hook shank length. Tie in the tail so that the tie-in is aligned with the hook point.



3. Tie in the rib of fine oval gold tinsel.



4. Take 4 strips of peacock herl and tie-in at the tail tie-in point.



5. Wrap the peacock herl forward with side-by-side wraps to a point approximately 2 eye lengths behind the eye of the hook. Trim the waste.



6. Take a brown hackle feather, size it, and strip off the waste end. With the top of the feather facing you, strip a few barbs off the bottom of the rachis and even a few more off the top. Now secure the hackle feather on the near side of the hook at the point where your body stopped.



7. Palmer the hackle rearward to the tail tie-in point and secure the rachis by counter wrapping the fine gold oval tinsel rib forward securing the hackle. By counter-wrapping the rib you are further securing the hackle.



8. Cut a clump of natural gray squirrel tail for the wing. The length of the wing should be short of the end of the tail. Secure the wing to the hook with a few thread wraps.



9. Take 1-2 strips of peacock herl and secure to the hook at the wing tie-in position. Wrap a small head of peacock herl over the black thread. Secure the peacock herl and trim the waste.
